- On average counties processed 99.56% of new TANF/Works applications in a timely fashion, which exceeds the state goal of 95%.
- Colorado did poorly (46th lowest) on its TANF work participation rates and is taking steps to address the issue.
- As a whole, countyadministered TANF programs look no different from stateadministered TANF programs on major measures.

Counties are processing Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) applications in a timely manner.

- On average counties processed 99.56% of new TANF applications in a timely fashion, which exceeds the state goal of 95% (CDHS, 2015 and 2015a).
- Colorado did poorly (46th lowest) on its TANF work participation rates and is taking steps to address the issue.
- **50.3** % of all families receiving cash assistance from the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program live in states with county-administered TANF programs (Urban Institute, 2015: 2).
- There is no important difference between state compared to county administered TANF programs when it comes to work participation rates. **State administered programs average 40.67% compared to 48.98% for county administered systems** (Urban Institute, 2015).
- Despite their structural differences, county-administered TANF programs as a group do not differ systematically from state-administered programs in client outcomes, nor are they systemically different in population size, political party, or other state characteristics (Urban Institute, 2015).
- As a whole, county-administered TANF programs look no different from state-administered TANF programs on major measures (Urban Institute, 2015: 84).
